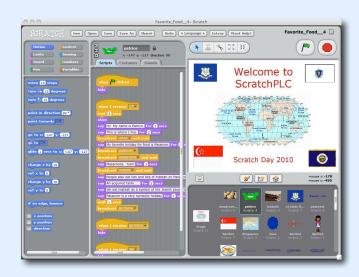

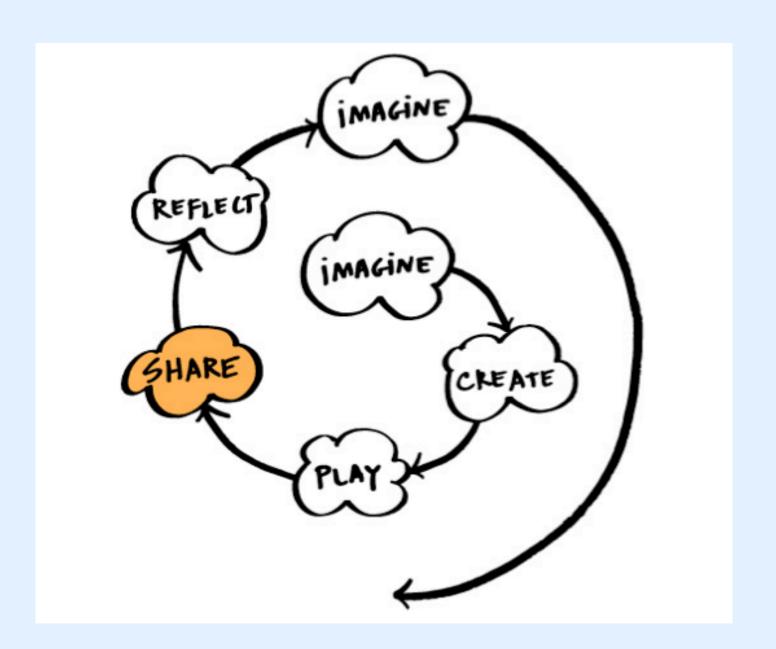

- •How will we respond when they have difficulties learning?

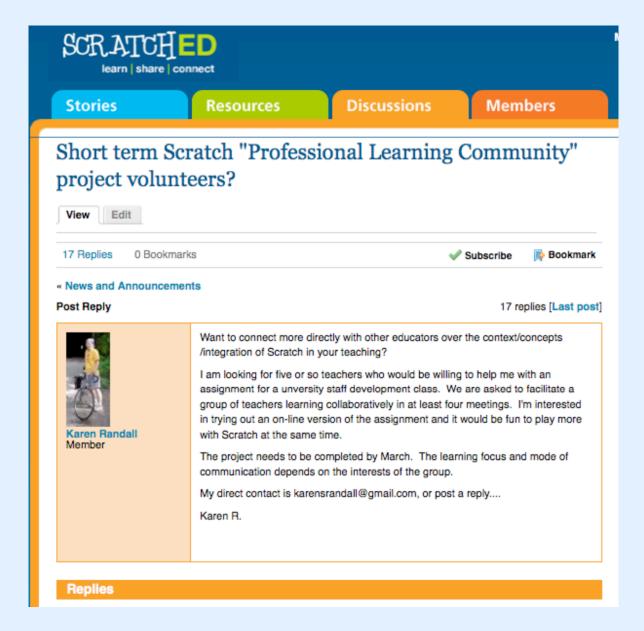

 - Space provided for open-ended dialog

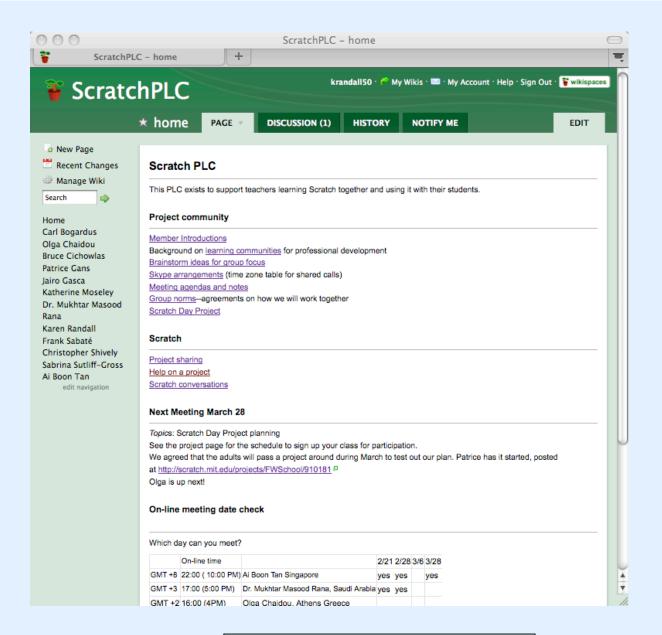
