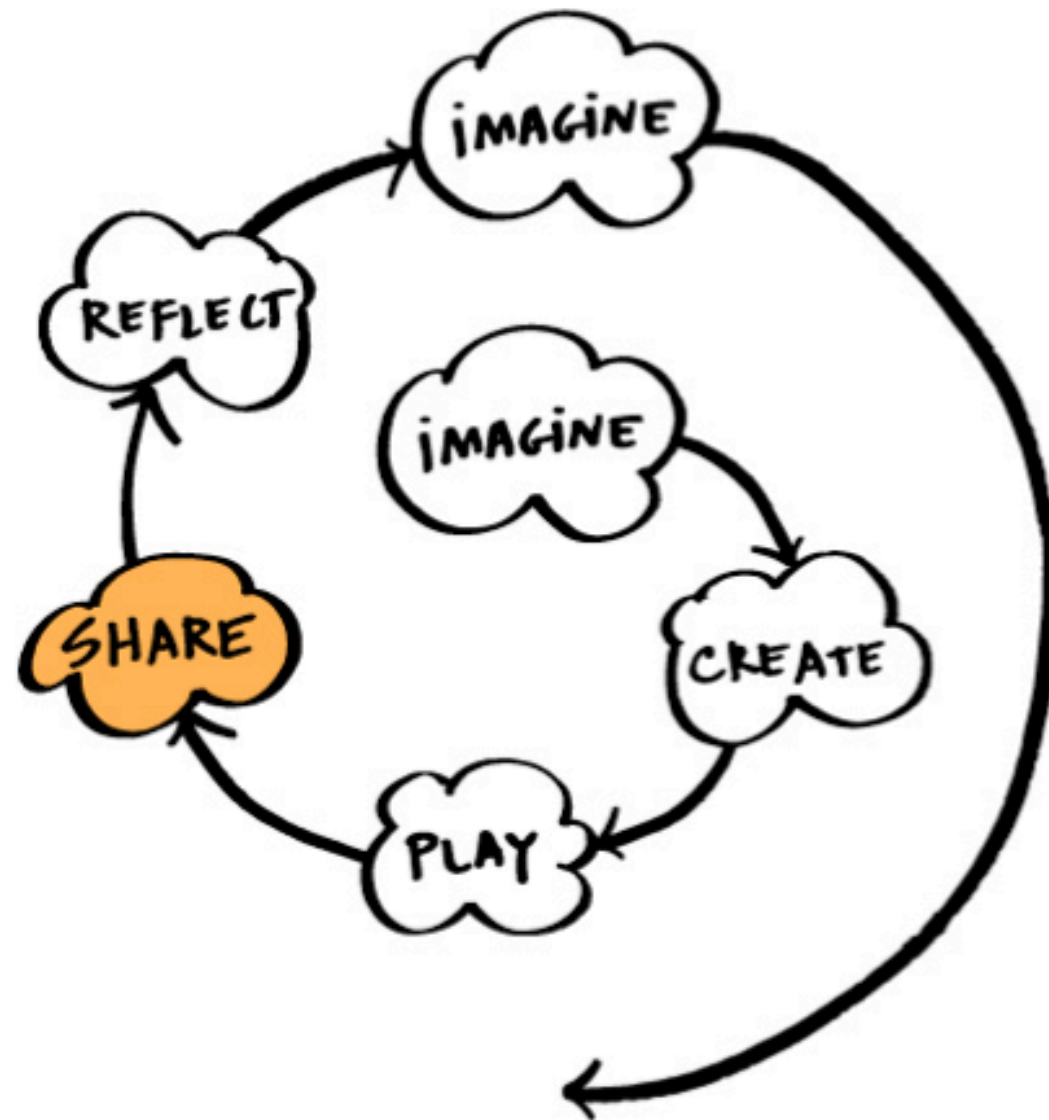

Professional learning communities investigate:

- What do we want students to learn?
- How will we know when they have learned it?
- How will we respond when they have difficulties learning?

Basis for effective PLCs

- Shared purpose established
- Group norms clear
- Grounded in reflective practice
 - Space provided for open-ended dialog
